BROAD BAY SAILING DINING CRUISE 2010, September 8, 9 and 10

The September Dining Cruise started on Wednesday, September 8th scheduled for five days in the lower Chesapeake Bay. The cruise was scheduled to start at York River Yacht Haven with Dozier's Regatta Point, Indian Creek Yacht Country Club, and Cape Charles Town Dock in succession afterwards. Charlie and Kathie started from Hampton Creek at 11:00 on Wednesday. That was approximately high slack tide with gusty southwest winds. We made good time for the first two hours with head-sail and some engine and were entering the York River. The tide was running against us and the wind was brisk out of the northwest and slowed us, arriving at 3:45.

Sergio Diehl on Modus Vivendi and Jim and Bev Borberg on Dreamtime left Deltaville going south early in the morning and had the tide and wind against them all the way for seven hours, arriving around 2:00.

We had cocktails on Wind Walker at 5:30 and dinner at 6:30 at the River's Inn restaurant at the marina. The current owner, of over two plus years, was one of the principal chefs at the Williamsburg Inn and provides some of the better meals on the Bay. I had a fried breaded trout meal with rice and veggies. I had a great tomato and crab bisque as an appetizer and Kathie had a huge veggie salad followed by a flounder main course.

The next morning we had a meeting at 9am to discuss the effects of the north wind and waves on the cruise and developed a new schedule with no more travel north. We agreed to have lunch at the River's Inn at noon and a picnic around the York River Yacht Haven pool with new gas grills for steaks. We started with cocktails at 5 pm followed by steaks and pot-luck veggie salads. We all did our chores in the afternoon and two friends of Sergio's, Frank and Jean, arrived at 4 o'clock.

Also decided at the 9am Thursday meeting was a trip to Bay Creek Marina, with dining at Aqua, departing at 9:30 Friday. As predicted on Friday morning, the winds were still out of the north at 8-20 mph. We left at 9:30 for a very nice sail out of the York River and continued good but bumpy sailing across the Bay. There were two sailboats going south and a lone power boat going north as we crossed the Bay. We arrived around 1:00 and near high tide so the channel to Bay Creek was not a problem. We had cocktails aboard Wind Walker at 5:30 and left to go to Aqua at 6:45. We all had nice meals at Aqua; Kathie had a veal and pasta special and I had a mixed seafood grill with rice and veggies. We had a chocolate truffle for desert that was out of this world. The problem with Aqua is the noise which makes dining uncomfortable. The food is good and reasonably priced, but not as good as chef Amy prepared before she left.

At noon on Saturday we powered around to Cape Charles Town Dock. Some of the group patrolled the town and others took a nap.

At 5:00, we gathered at the gazebo at the marina for cocktails and to watch the boats come and go and the watermen come in for the day. Cape Charles can be characterized by its flies and other pests, which make life uncomfortable for sailors. The Coast Guard Station is next to the marina with a large fence.

At 6:15 we left the cocktails and walked across the railroad tracks to Kelley's Pub. This is a surprisingly nice restaurant considering its location in Cape Charles. It is in an old bank building and is very broken up into smaller rooms, which makes for quieter dining. I had a great fish chowder and two crab cakes with a cherry-cheese-cake for dessert. We agreed that it was better dining than Aqua.

There is a railcar in Cape Charles that takes dinner and pizza rides up and down the track for several hours that is worth looking into. The marina hands out a flier with the particulars.

On the next morning at 7am, "Wind Walker" departed to return home for a Master Works performance at Sandler in the afternoon. The others departed for Little Creek at 8:00. It was a rough ride home with rain, low visibility, brisk winds, initially out of the southeast, and 4-5 foot seas until about 10:00 when everything quieted down. And the sun sets on another successful cruise.

I want to say what fun it was to go on cruises with all of you, and I especially want to thank the members who planned these fun cruises.
